

Pittsburg, Pa., April 24 .- The most widespread and destructive storm, from a material point of view, has passed. It has left a zone of ruin 200 miles in diameter. Cities 70 miles from Pittsburg were tied up by one of the worst snow storms ever known. While the There Was Much Valuable Express Matter On snow fall was from 18 inches to three feet deep, which is not extraordinary, the snow was so wet that it clung in weighty masses to shade and fruit trees and electric wires and poles, bearing them to the earth. It even settled on steam and street railways like wet sand, stopping all traffic and making pedestrianism almost impossible. The fall was so easy and spontaneous in some places that the residents declare it seemed like the burst-

ing of a snow cloud. A few miles from these unfortunate towns were municipalities in just as dire straits from rain, but speedier prospect for relief, as the rain will run off faster than the snow can melt. Still in these places traffic was practically suspended. Water overflowed and washed out railroad tracks and hillsides came down and buried the rails.
