The city council at its next meeting will take action on the sewer proposition which is now being considered by property owners within the limits of the proposed new sewer district. Since the E street sewer was built by private enterprise, and its lateral branches constructed our people have had a practical demonstration of the sanitary benefits accruing from a perfect sewerage system. Fear of overtaxation is more fatal to the growth of a town than the most unsanitary condition, and it is therefore hoped that property owners will consider their best interests by encouraging the formation of the C street sewer district.

Since Chas. Brown and E. L. Canby, president and cashier respectively of the Vancouver bank, each shot himself after confessing to the worst kind of dishonesty in wrecking the bank, it appears that they had moral courage sufficient to realize that their room in the world would be preferable to their dishonorable presence. The suffering that their perfidy entailed upon others, though hard to bear financially, is nothing compared to a life devoid of respect that would have been theirs had the two men attempted to "brave it out" among their fellows instead of imitating the example of Judas and relieving society of their presence.

"On Friday morning a train composed of twelve refrigerator cars rolled out of Newton, Kan., for California, and each car was laden with eggs gathered in the vicinity of that town by one firm," says the Kansas City Journal. "The twelve cars contained 144,000 dozen, or nearly two million eggs. The train goes as a special, and is the first instance of a train carrying nothing but eggs which has been reported by any road running into California." There is a sermon in this, and the California and Oregon men should deplore the fact that her tribe is not sufficiently numerous to obviate the necessity of such shipments. Poultry raisers of the Pacific coast should be able to supply the market with poultry products as cheaply as they can be hauled a thousand miles or more. But we buy our eggs in Kansas. We also ship our hogs east and buy hams and bacon in Omaha, and stand the freight both ways. California pickles come here by the carload, and yet an acre in cucumbers will produce as much here as any ground on earth. Verily, we must learn to produce and to manufacture if we would prosper.

An attempt has been made to use the frauds in the commissary department at Manila as an indictment against the army and the army system. The reports of the frauds have been exaggerated and enlarged upon to create the impression that there is the odor of scandal about all government transactions in the Philippines. This is wholly unwarranted. It now appears that the conspiracy to sell surplus commissary stores was discovered by the army secret service. No charges were made by civilians or others, but when the military officers suspected that stores were being sold an investigation was made, and fraudulent sales to the amount of \$4,000 were discovered. It is estimated that all the frauds will not amount to more than \$10,000. It also may be found that many of the parties accused are guilty of irregularity instead of fraud. Certainly some of the accused officers are confident of their ability to prove their innocence. No one need fear that any man guilty of fraud will be shielded by the investigators. That is not the custom in army circles. It may be taken for granted that, when the report has been made, all the facts will be in the possession of the public.

It has practically been decided by the Cramps shipbuilding company to launch the battleship Maine on Memorial day. Survivors of the original Maine and the widows and orphans of the sailors killed in Havana harbor will probably be invited to attend the launching.

In New York Roosevelt and Odell are now regarded as full fledged rivals for the republican presidential nomination in 1904, from the democratic standpoint of prediction. Republican wiseacres have again brought Gen. Miles to the front as a possible democratic rival in the race for the presidency.

President McKinley's only stops in Oregon as he passes through will be at Salem and Portland. It is to be regretted that he could not have visited the mouth of the Columbia river where the government will be asked to expend vast sums of money in improvements. A personal knowledge would prove beneficial to the president in making recommendations to congress.

It is reported that the clam is in danger of extermination. If this doleful prophecy comes true there will be fewer people spending their vacation down by the sea, for who would wish to pass the summer on a clamless coast? A shore whereon no merry digger seeks his unferocious prey would seem lonely and the table will be inhospitable which is ungraced by dishes in which the clam holds the place of honor. The crab that flourishes in the broad Pacific has its sturdy protectors. Shall the clam lack defenders?

In the railroad consolidations that are now taking place, enormously inflated values are the rule. But there is one thing that always takes place: The railroad men themselves retain the mortgages on the railroad property which are good, while the water in the stock goes to ordinary investors. There has been great excitement lately in stocks. Thousands of small investors are buying stocks that are not worth the paper they are written on. They are being deliberately swindled by the big fish. The little fish have become bold again and are swimming into the pool where the big fish play, in a deliberate preparation for a panic.

For years an attempt has been made to secure the release of the Younger brothers from the Minnesota penitentiary, where they are confined for murder and robbery. Why release these men? They are professional thieves; many murders have been committed by them. The attempt to secure their release, which now promises to be successful, will encourage lynching. What are penitentiaries for if not for the confinement of men like the Younger brothers? Why should their release receive the attention of the Minnesota legislature? Why should people all over the country take an interest in their release? Is this not carrying sentiment too far?

A judge in Crawfordsville, Ind., has disfranchised fifty voters who were found guilty of selling their votes at the last election. "It is a fundamental principle of law" said the judge, "that an agent who has betrayed his trust can be removed and the power invested in him revoked. The voter is the agent of the government for the purpose of carrying into effect its principles, and the moment he offers to sell himself out he becomes false to his trust and an enemy to his country. If a man steals ten cents' worth of property he may be convicted of petit larceny and disfranchised. Is vote selling a crime of less magnitude?" A righteous and wholesome ruling, which deserves all possible publicity.

The negro question is having influence on Cuban politics, says the Globe Democrat. The great dimensions of the negro ingredient of the population of the island is one of the considerations which will make trouble for the Cubans if they set up a government of their own. This is one of the issues which is frightening thoughtful persons on the island. As an independent nation the color question offers a chance for serious embarrassment. As a part of the United States, Cuba would not be affected by this issue. Annexation would send in so many white men that they would soon gain so great a preponderance that the race issue would disappear. There are so many reasons for annexation that the separatists are losing ground. Even Gomez has been reported recently to be in favor of making the American connection permanent.

President Diaz of Mexico has been urged to take a pleasure trip to Europe. But Diaz will not go to Europe, for various reasons. As he is the whole of the present government, he is naturally in favor of its retaining power. While he is in Mexico the Mexicans love and respect the head of their government. After a summer in Europe President Diaz would probably find a new government in Mexico when he returned.

While everything in the Chinese situation remains in doubt, there seems to be no doubt of Russia's intentions. She is preparing for war and will soon have 300,000 men in Manchuria, and may send a corps into Korea. That will mean an immediate conflict with Japan. The intention of the United States in keeping out of the trouble is made apparent in the order to the navy department to begin at once the reduction of vessels on the Asiatic station by bringing all American ships home.

### AGUINALDO'S MANIFESTO.

The expected manifesto of Aguinaldo was issued last Friday. The noted prisoner accepts American sovereignty and urges his people to terminate hostilities. Following is the substance of the address: "The lessons taught with full meaning, and which have recently come to my knowledge, suggest with irresistible force that complete termination of hostilities and lasting peace are absolutely essential to the welfare of the Philippine Islands. The Filipinos have never faltered in following the path pointed out by their fortitude and courage. The time has come, however, in which they find their advance along this path impeded by an irresistible force, presenting to them the cause of peace. This cause has been joyfully embraced by a majority of my fellow-countrymen, who have united around the glorious sovereign banner of the United States. In this banner they repose their trust and the belief that under its protection the Filipino people will attain all the promised liberties which they are beginning to enjoy. The country has declared unmistakably in favor of peace. So be it. I proclaim to the world that I cannot refuse to heed the voice of the people longing for peace, nor the lamentations of the thousands of families yearning to see their dear ones enjoying liberty and the promised generosity of the great American nation. By acknowledging and accepting the sovereignty of the United States throughout the Philippine Archipelago, as I now do, and without any reservation whatsoever, I believe that I am serving thee, my beloved country. May happiness be thine." To signalize this important step in the pacification of the country, General McArthur orders the release, on swearing allegiance to the United States, of 1000 insurgent prisoners.

### The Markets.

Yesterday's Portland quotations indicated a change for the better. Wheat and wool are not moving very actively at the present time, although there is a considerable amount of the former and a record-breaking amount of the latter for sale if prices reach the ideas of holders.

The mohair clip is moving out at a much more rapid rate than it did last year when the prices were materially higher. Oats are selling at the highest prices of the season, with a prospect for the bins to be pretty well scraped before another crop is available. Barley is also very firm, with an upward tendency. Potatoes have taken an upward spurt and are selling at the best prices of the season. The butter market is very soft and prices are approaching bedrock. Eggs are firm and poultry is weaker under heavy receipts and a light demand. Veal and pork are firm at full prices. Groceries are firm with a good business reported. There has been decided strength in the American wheat market the past few days and the European market has followed to a certain extent. Damage is alleged to the American crop as the principal cause of the strength, and according to reports the California crop is in a serious condition in some sections, and unless there is rain very soon will result in a much stronger market. Locally there is not much wheat selling, and that which is "dribbling" out is changing hands at pretty full values. As high as 59 cents was paid for Walla Walla recently, and there were the usual reports that even higher limits were out in the interior.
