The Umatilla county court has made an order which ignores the provisions of the law passed by the legislature of 1901, in regard to selling lands heretofore purchased at tax sales. Instead of selling these lands to the highest bidder, the county court proposes to get some return from the investment and will lease them instead of selling.

The revival services at the M. E. church closed last Sunday evening with a very interesting meeting. Mrs. E. M. Barrett who has been preaching for four weeks goes from here to La Grande, where meetings will begin next Sunday evening at the Methodist church of that place of which W. H. Miller, who was pastor last year at Sheridan, is now in charge. At the M. E. church of this city the pastor H. T. Atkinson will preach next Sunday, morning and evening.

Last Wednesday evening about fifty members of McMinnville camp Woodman of the World went down to North Yamhill with their crack drill team to initiate thirteen new members into Yamhill camp. About two-hundred woodmen were present representing camps from all over the county. After the initiation all repaired to the banquet hall where a very sumptuous spread had been prepared by the Women of Woodcraft.

Toasts were responded to by Consul Commander C. C. Murton. W. T. Macy, and Henry Gee from McMinnville camp; Dr. Coffeen, from Carlton; Rev. J. F. Day, from Newberg; F. M. Garrison, from Amity; Dr. Everest, from Gaston, and V. W. Pierce of North Yamhill. A very enjoyable time was spent which wound up in a moonlight ride home in the wee small hours of the morning.

Jim Everest was displaying a curiosity one day last week in the way of a young chicken endowed with four legs. It's suspected that it may be a fore runner of the "new hen" which is to play such an important factor in Oregon's diversified industry. Hon. J. C. Nelson showed us an interesting paper the other day, upon which, with the exception of two years, 1864 and 1884, was a record of all the county taxes he has paid into the treasury of old Yamhill, since his first arrival into the land of promise, with the names of the sheriffs to whom the taxes were paid. The first entry is that of 1884, when his taxes amounting to \$1.25 were paid to Sheriff J. G. Baker. From that time to the present he has paid to the various sheriffs of the county nearly four thousand dollars, which makes a record than which in all probability not many Yamhill farmers can show a better.

 European governments seem inclined to shut their eyes to the future. Without any cause for war other than their own seeking, they contemplate war with apparent disregard of circumstances. Confident of their ability to float loans for some years longer, they go on adding to expenditures that can only be met by new loans or increased taxation. France heads the list in the magnitude of her public debt, but as it is all held at home, it is more easily borne than smaller debts, the interest of which goes abroad. France owes in round numbers \$6,000,000, but every dollar of the interest is distributed among her own people. This enormous debt keeps France in a peaceful mood. As a rule, these small bondholders think twice over a warlike proposition.

Catching the Infection.

The spirit of improvement has been made manifest in McMinnville's western suburbs during the past winter and spring, and many changes have been made for the benefit and convenience of those whose dwellings are in that section. The most extensive, and the piece of improvement calling for the greatest outlay of capital, was that of S. H. Maris. He has built an addition to his residence in front. A sixteen-foot addition to his greenhouse has also been put on, which makes the length of that well appointed structure seventy-six feet. Mrs. Herbert has had a greenhouse built on her farm during the winter, and Jack Emmett has done considerable fencing and clearing land. Henry Gabriel has also had a great deal of fencing and other improvement made about his place. Those who are living on rented land are keeping up in the march of progress, too, for it seems to be a fact that the spirit of enterprise is catching. And well may our farmers feel encouraged to make their habitations more cheerful, for theirs is a happy condition compared with the surroundings of many who till the soil in other portions of the earth. In some of the eastern states, where the white snowflakes are just now changing themselves into the white apple blossoms, the farmers are just gathering sufficient courage to open the barn door and dig the rusty nose of the plow into the stony, frozen earth. Here the long, deep, black furrows have been rolled over during every month of winter, and the pale cheek of January does not have to wait until June to blush under sunny skies. Our spring is two weeks behind schedule time this year, but under these adverse conditions we are eminently more fortunate than our eastern neighbors, whose cattle and sheep are usually paying house rent and chewing the cud of high-priced hay until long after the livestock in this section has become fat on pastures new.
