All the boys who went were required to eat a hearty breakfast, put a cracker in their pockets and be at the Methodist church at 8 a. m. Of course they had a good time.

Within a month several thousand eastern people have arrived at Portland and are now hunting homes throughout the state, many of them in Yamhill county. We have in this county too many large farms that are unwieldy and therefore unprofitable. If industrious and thrifty people were encouraged to buy small farms at a fair price and improve them it would be better for the seller, the buyer and the county at large.

The April number of the Pacific Monthly contained the opening chapter of a serial written by Chas. Grissen, entitled "The Prophet of the Mayax," a tale of prehistoric times on the western continent. Mr. Grissen has based his serial upon historic research, and deals with events in South America at about the beginning of the christian era, when the country was in a high state of civilization. The story will continue in the publication for a year or longer.

More people visited Masonic cemetery on decoration day and carried a greater profusion of flowers than ever known before. It was also noticeable that many old graves which were hitherto neglected badly, were cleared off, fallen tombstones replaced and beautiful bouquets placed upon the mounds. It can safely be asserted that the cemetery presented the best appearance in its history. This is commendable, and let the good work be kept up from year to year. There is a proposition being considered to extend the water supply through the grounds by means of a succession of barrels.

Lars Gregerson without doubt has the best milk cow in this section of the country if not in the state. We are not able to say just how much she gives but we are informed she is a heavy milker. Recently a half gallon of butter was made from a half gallon of milk, by Mrs. Phil Withycombe. This cow's milk has a rating at the local creamery of .0525 butter fat, which is far ahead of anything else ever tested at this creamery. It is quite possible that with careful attention this cow could be made to carry the world's record as a butter producer, if she is not already entitled to it. She is a member of the Shorthorn Dunham family.—North Yamhill Record.

Washington county was the scene of considerable damage to wheat last year by the ravages of the Hessian fly. The conditions in that country this year are indicated in the Hillsboro Independent in the following: "There is a difference of judgment with the farmers regarding the damage doing by the Hessian fly. Some say they never had finer wheat fields than at present and the outlook for a good crop was never better, while others assert that fully five straws of every seven has a fly on it. The first declare that conditions are not that bad, and further that the fly is not to be dreaded so much as rust. They say that one, two or even more straws are effected, yet what remains continues to grow and will give good plump grain, while on the other hand rust arrests the growth so that at harvest only an inferior, shriveled quality of wheat is put in the bin. No rust has yet appeared and it is to be hoped that the red rust will not put in an appearance this year."

Indian War Veterans.

T. A. Wood, grand commander Indian War veterans, requests Indian War Veterans and friends to send the names of all comrades, their wives or widows who have died since June 1st, 1900, so that a record of the same can be made at the grand encampment which meets in Portland, June 13, 1901. As very important business will be up for consideration, veterans from Oregon, Washington and Idaho are urged to be present. The sons and daughters of Indian War veterans, will treat veterans, their wives and widows to a sumptuous dinner on that occasion. The grand encampment will determine on a definite course of action to enable veterans the more certainly to secure their rights.

Spare the Birds.

An exchange commenting on the wide-spread destruction of birds, in most cases to satisfy the gratification of some sportsman who delights in killing just to see them fall, finds a parallel in the increase of insects. It remarks: "The agricultural department reports that insects are destroying crops in various parts of the country. Formerly the birds destroyed the insects, but man destroyed the birds, and now he must do their work or go hungry." It opens an avenue of thought rarely considered, but its force is apparent to all.
