MARQUIS OF ORMONDE

Succeeds King Edward as Commodore of the Yacht Squadron.

The Marquis of Ormonde is now the commodore of the Royal Yacht Squadron, succeeding King Edward in that position. The Duke of Leeds has been made vice-commodore.

Lord Ormonde is one of the most notable men in the Irish peerage. He is the hereditary chief butler of Ireland and vice-admiral of Leinster. Born at

Kilkenny Castle on Oct. 5, 1844, he succeeded the second marquis, his father, in the great estates of the marquisate in 1854. He was educated at Harrow and joined the First Life Guards in 1863, retiring with the rank of captain ten years later. The marquis has always been devoted to the pastime of yachting and is himself an excellent sailor. His marchioness is the daughter of the first Duke of Westminster.
