 George Jones writes down from the mill to the factory force that he has just sawed up a tree that made good marketable lumber 152 feet from the stump, and was 36 inches in diameter. At the market price of lumber in the yard, this tree alone will make \$300 worth. A board 36 inches wide from this tree can now be seen at the yard. It is one foot wider than can be planed by machinery. A load of 3,000 feet of fencing was recently hauled from the yard to Amity with a four-horse team. Frank Adams says that his brother-in-law, Chas. Scott, hauled from the old mill near Meadow lake, the largest load of lumber ever hauled out of the mountains at this place. It contained 5,000 feet. A load of 4,700 feet is quite common in their hauling.
