The Rich Cheatem Hills.
It appears that while the oldest resi-
dents of this county have been aware
that there are different "somethings"
of a mineral nature lying in the hills and
valleys all over the county, they have paid
little attention to anything else except
the tilling of the fertile soil. But during
the past few months strangers have in-
vaded the quiet fields, and those versed
in mineralogy have pronounced the lower
strata full of hidden wealth. Besides
indications of petroleum on the land held
by the Yamhill Coal & Oil Co., which
company is the pioneer in development
work, they have found croppings of a
good quality of coking coal. An experi-
enced prospector has been investigating
their holdings and has located a bed of
potter's clay, which has been tested by
the Pacific Pottery at Portland. A ledge
of iron ore, reducible and giving eighty
percent of iron is another of the valuable
minerals. Kaolin, or fine porcelain clay,
has been found, and specimens sent east
to be tested. Bauxite, or aluminum clay,
is another one of the deposits, and on the
lands there are indications of beds of
graphite. Altogether, there are possi-
bilities of great development in this sec-
tion, and the Yamhill Coal & Oil com-
