J. W. Stallcop, was married on Wednes-  
day of last week to Miss Maud Hadley,  
daughter of C. B. Hadley of Tillamook.  
They will reside in Independence. The  
wedding was held at the Allen house,  
and was an elaborate one.

A Yamhill county man was in Cor-  
vallis Wednesday with a four horse team  
after a load of mesquite seed. He was  
accommodated with a ton, produced on  
J. H. Mason's farm in Alsea, and the  
seed will be hauled to the Yamhill farm  
for sowing. About 16,000 pounds of mes-  
quite seed produced in the vicinity has  
been marketed in Corvallis this season.  
The price has ranged from two to three  
cents per pound, the average being about  
two and a quarter.—Corvallis Times.

J. C. Cooper hands us the following  
notice: A number of the socialists of  
this county met in this place some time  
ago and made a temporary organization  
by electing S. M. Osman of Chase, pres-  
ident; A. M. Peery, vice president;  
H. Oliver, secretary; S. Richardson,  
treasurer. The officers of the meeting  
were made an executive committee, and  
in accordance with the above authority,  
hereby invite all socialists of this county  
to meet at McMinnville, on Saturday,  
Nov. 15, 1901, at 10 a. m., to make a  
county organization, and to transact  
such other business as may be deemed  
advisable. The public invited. Good  
speakers will be present.

About 50 representative hoggrowers  
met at Woodburn on Monday. The  
object of the meeting was to consider a  
proposition made by M. H. Durst, an ex-  
tensive hoggrower of Wheatland, Cal.,  
who ships direct to the London buyers.  
The growers at the meeting were unani-  
mously in favor of accepting Mr. Durst's  
proposition, and a contract was formulat-  
ed to be submitted to an attorney for  
legal correction, then to be printed and  
circulated for signatures. Mr. Durst is  
to be notified within four days if the 5000  
bares promised at the meeting would be  
delivered. In accordance with the con-  
tract, Mr. Durst advances 9 cents per  
pound to the grower at the time his hogs  
are shipped. He pays all costs on these  
hops, including freight, insurance, stor-  
age, etc., out of his commission of 4  
cents per pound. Mr. Durst asked for  
at least 3000 bales of choice hops, which  
he will select by sample from the  
5000 to be tendered him. He will not  
promise to take more, but might do so.  
This step is taken to demonstrate to the  
growers what can be done next season  
by consigning a larger pool direct to  
London. The growers were further en-  
couraged by Mr. Durst stating that he  
would endeavor to secure a lower freight  
rate, and if he succeeded he would add  
the amount of the reduction to the 9  
cents advance paid to the grower, with-  
out recourse. Chairman Egan appointed  
growers in the different districts to  
circulate the contracts and work for the  
pool. The meeting adjourned to recon-  
vene at the call of the chair. There is  
no doubt that Mr. Durst's proposition  
will be accepted, and more than the re-  
quired 3000 bales of choice hops fur-  
nished him.
