Rev. and Mrs. Joseph Hoberg were married in Galena, Ills., November 13, 1851. They moved to Lausling, Iowa, in 1857, and came to Oregon in 1866, by way of Nicaragua. Their first home in Oregon was in Salem. In 1869 Mr. Hoberg became a member of the Oregon conference of the Methodist church, and for twelve years preached up and down this valley, gaining a circle of acquaintances and friends which remains to this day. They were residents of Lafayette for about 21 years, and twelve years ago removed to McMinnville. They have had twelve children, eight of whom are living, and all will be present at the anniversary next week.

Mr. Hoberg's two younger brothers, C. H. of Eugene, and Christopher of Portland, will also be present. It would be a good time to take a new census, as descendants and immediate relatives to the number of 33 are expected.

The children in the order of their ages are: Frank, of Portland; Mrs. Verona Nelson of Newberg; Mrs. Ella Metzger of Dallas; Grant, of Baker City; Mrs. Georgia Knight of Seattle; R. O. of Norway, Or.; Mrs. Evaline Millsap of Lebanon, Or.; and Charles of Baker City.

Two hundred announcements of the coming celebration, printed in gold with embossed "50", have been issued. A reception will be held at their home from 7:30 to 10 p. m.

To those who know Mr. and Mrs. Hoberg best, laudation might seem like "carrying coals to Newcastle." We wish to say, however, at this most opportune time, that no one more sincerely rejoices that they have been permitted to journey together over such an extended period of time, with such loving confidence in each other and with such fruition of health and happiness, as do the editors of The Reporter. 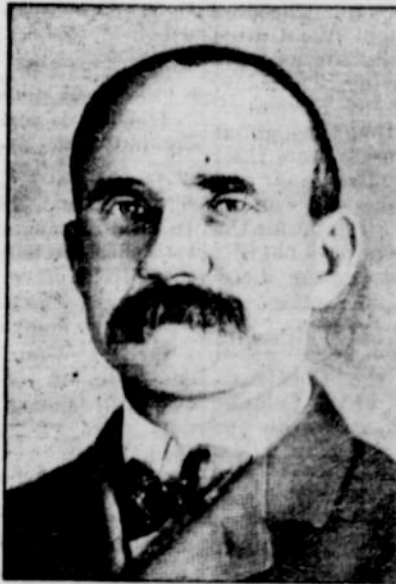

As a counter to the action of Dallas College in ruling out football the faculty of the state university at Eugene has decided to allow its football aggregation to travel about and go on a tour of one month. They claim it will prove a good advertisement for the university. Our judgment is that Dallas College has the best advertisement if she will push it, and put it in her catalogue.

C. W. Fulton of Astoria expressed himself thusly to a representative of the Oregonian: "I wish to state very emphatically, that I am not a candidate for governor; nor will I under any consideration whatever, allow my name to come before the state convention as such. All reports to the contrary are utterly without foundation. Under no circumstances will I be a candidate for the office or accept the nomination." Mr. Fulton did not care to be interviewed further, and very politely excused himself. You remember also that John H. Mitchell was not a candidate for senator.

Officers of the Oregon Hopgrowers' Association give out the information that the success of the pool, which was decided upon at a meeting held at Woodburn October 21, is now assured. The hops will be prepared for shipment to England at once, whether they will be accompanied by M. H. Durst, a Marion county buyer, and a representative of the hopgrowers, who will have charge of the disposition of the hops. Mr. Durst is the man behind the pool. He agrees to advance 9 cents per pound for the hops, without recourse upon the growers. The growers are to profit by any rise in prices, less a reasonable commission to be allowed Mr. Durst.

H. P. Ford was in Hillsboro last week looking after evidence to be used in the action which the county has brought to recover the balance which Clark & Buchanan reported is due from him. Mr. Ford brought with him Mr. H. B. Dyer, accountant, whom he charged with reviewing the same figures which Clark & Buchanan used in arriving at their conclusion. He did not go beyond finding that C & B had adopted a theory. Mr. Ford claims that he collected the taxes according to the extensions made on the roll and that he settled by the same figures. After Mr. Dyer discovered the errors made by C & B, he stopped work and went home. The trial of this case will be interesting and will be as much an examination of Clark & Buchanan as of Mr. Ford's accounts.—Independent.
