NOW IN SESSION.

The Yamhill county annual institute opened at the court house Wednesday. The attendance soon reached over 100. Prof. Alderman is the efficient secretary. The exercises opened with a song service led by Supt. Littlefield. Prof. S. Y. Gillan opened the work of the institute with a talk on Pedagogy, using illustrative lessons, which was both interesting and instructive. After a short recess Prof. Robinson presented the subject, "Foundation of Reading." Prof. Gillan while treating the subject of English advanced the idea that teachers should teach that form, shape and spelling are synonymous and mean the same. In the afternoon the Professor gave globe lessons in geography. Prof. Robinson opened the subject of Numbers, teaching that the first work should be with objects. The idea of addition and subtraction should be marked out by the pupil with the use of object counters.

Thursday afternoon Prof. Campbell of the State Normal School treated the subject of "Supplementary Reading Books as Adopted by the State," showing sample copies of many of them. The lecture in the evening was largely attended by teachers and others, and was a rare treat. A good musical program was given. On Thursday the institute opened by singing the national hymn. Prof. Gillan opened the work of the day with the subject of "Pedagogy," by bringing out how to train the eye and hand of the small child. The subject of English was continued by Prof. Gillan. Prof. Robinson discussed the subject of Arithmetic, which was presented in a very creditable manner, showing that Arithmetic was very easily understood—when the pupils were familiar with principles, of multiplication.
