Rev. J. H. Douglas, the Baptist pastor at Amity, has severed his pastoral relations there, and left on Tuesday for Illinois. The change is made in hope of benefiting the health of certain members of his family. Amity people are said to be almost a unit in regretting the change.

M. U. Gortner, local agent for the Kingston Gold Mines Company, has received instructions from the officers of the company that the stock will be advanced in price after this month. Those who have secured or negotiated for stock at ten cents a share will be more fortunate than those who may come in later on.

R. L. Conner returned from a stay of ten days in eastern Oregon, on Monday. He says hauling wheat is still the principal industry up there, and the wind blows all the time. The weather was freezing cold at night, and he observed six inches of dust in the road between Arlington and Condon.

McMinnville is coming to the front as one of the leading fancy poultry centers of the state. Among those who have recently imported eastern birds is C. H. Fleming, who, on Monday of this week, received direct from Iowa one of the finest pens of thoroughbred White Wyandottes that has ever been imported into the state. These birds are from the noted poultry yard of Curtis W. Green of Eldora, Iowa, and were among the highest scoring birds in the state.

An analysis Monday of the vinegar made from refuse prunes at the college, yielded 2.16 per cent of acetic acid, a result far above expectations. Four per cent of acetic acid makes standard vinegar, and the realization of more than half that amount in a month gives great encouragement in the experiment. It is now believed that a higher per cent will be secured than is possible in pure cedar vinegar, which is generally five and a half to six per cent. Three or four months will be required to perfect this experiment.—Corvallis Times.

Judge Boise, in the Salem book exporting case, decided that the county court may have the books of county officers experted at any time, and by any persons they choose. He bases the right to appoint on the decision by the supreme court of the state establishing the right to the employment of help to collect taxes in addition to the sheriff. He thinks the question of time for examining the records is a matter for the county court to decide with reference to what will best subserve the interests of the county. The other officers will withdraw their resistance, and the examination will proceed.

It would appear that Dayton has been doing some little business in the fruit line this season. Some weeks ago the Dayton evaporating company shipped a carload of evaporated prunes to Portland. Week before last the company shipped a car of evaporated apples to Seattle, and last week they shipped three cars of prunes to the east, to Council Bluffs, Iowa, and Mankato, Minnesota. The Dayton evaporating company has a number of carloads of evaporated fruit to ship. By the way, it is conceded that they now have some of the finest evaporated apples ever turned out in this part of the universe. Besides what fruit the Dayton evaporating company has evaporated this season, other evaporators in this vicinity have evaporated large quantities of fruit. L. Wambegans, who operated his own evaporator here in town and also that of W. F. Yoe, evaporated a large quantity of fruit which is of very fine quality. F. A. Post at Lambert's landing, on the Willamette river, evaporated a number of carloads of fruit, and also C. Unruh, several miles south of Dayton, and Mrs. E. C. Robertson, J. C. Morin, and John M. P. who lately put up a drier at his place, the old Gen. Palmer home.—Herald.
