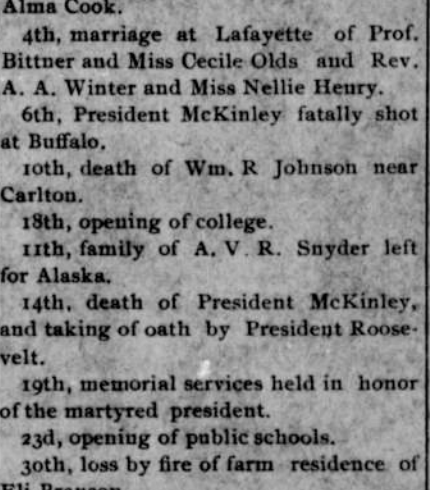

**DEATH OF W. E. HAIGHT.**

Will E. Haight was born at Rockford, Ill., Oct. 29, 1861, son of Elias and Susie Hough Haight. He came to Portland in 1885, where he was engaged in the manufacture of machinery until the fall of 1891, when he, with a party of thirty, went to Mexico to join a co-operative colony. He remained there two years and then went to Chicago, and from thence to a school at Scranton, Pa., where he took a course in architectural drawing to perfect some inventions which he had on hand. He returned to Oregon in the fall of 1896. March 28, 1897, he was united in marriage to Nettie A. Olds, of McMinnville. He has since been engaged in farming and mechanical inventions, several of which he had designed to have patented. Aside from this he was quite an artist in crayon work, in which he took much delight during his leisure hours.

His health began to fail about a year ago but the cause was not known until a few weeks ago, when it was discovered to be cancer of the bowels. He submitted to a surgical operation at St. Vincent's hospital, Tuesday, Dec. 17, and died Saturday, Dec. 21, at 7:30 p. m. The remains were brought to McMinnville on Sunday morning, and the funeral services were held at the home at 2:30 p. m., services conducted by C. Grissen. Mr. Ivan Daniel, a personal friend, read a paper, which the deceased himself had written for the occasion. The remains were taken to Portland on Thursday morning, where, in accordance with the deceased's expressed desire, they will be cremated.

Mr. Haight was a gentleman of quiet and studious disposition; gentle, kind and affectionate in his nature, endearing himself to and winning the respect of all with whom he came in contact. He was a man of sterling temperance, integrity and honesty. His religion was the religion of doing good to humanity, and his firm faith and belief in a future life made him unafraid of death. Such lives have not been lived in vain, and the good that they have shall surely live after them.

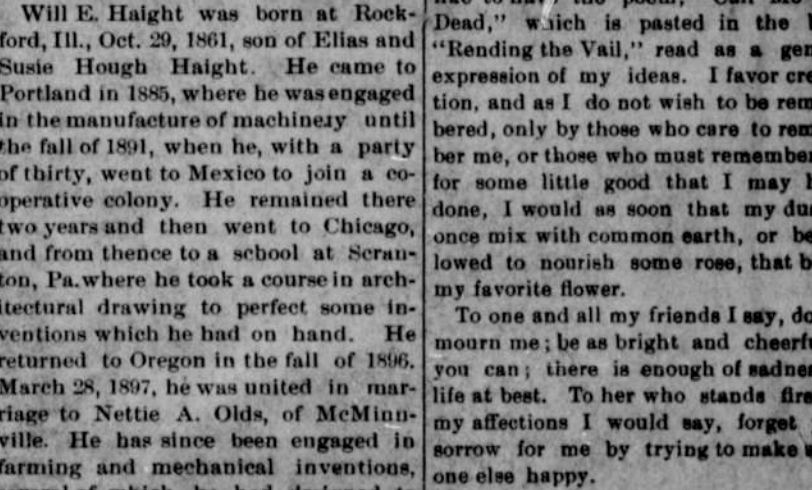
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
