The remains were brought to Mc-Minnville on Sunday morning, and the funeral services were held at the home at 2:30 p. m., services conducted by C Grissen. desire, they will be cremated. Id not flatter myself that I am better that most of my fellow men. I expect suffer for the wrong I have done, but would rather do so than to have don anyone an injury and then go "Sec free." Beyond the gr ie I hope for life. jestice and progress, which will, nece sarily, bring nappiness. To all m friends and loved ones, I bid a tempo ry farewell.
