

The race for the United States senatorship is beginning to wax warm in every part of Oregon. The fight, as it is now shaping itself, seems to be wholly and exclusively between Hon. H. W. Corbett, of Portland, and Senator McBride, the present representative of Oregon at Washington. As between these two known candidates, the choice in this section is, so far as our canvass of opinion has been made, almost unanimous for Mr. Corbett. Of course the people do not elect the United States senators, but they do elect the state legislators who have to do with the election of the state's representatives at Washington. Without any attempt at a possible coercion of legislative opinions from this end of the state, the Mail feels that it is safe in positively stating that if a vote of the people was to be taken Mr. Corbett would receive an overwhelming majority. The republicans of this end of the state admire representative men politically; men who have been republicans from principle, rather than policy; men who have convictions to back their opinion, and men with sufficient brain matter to form opinions and courage to express them.
