Yamhill tent No. 24, Knights of the Maccabees, initiated 28 candidates Monday evening, January 20th. Many of them were representative business men of this city. Floor work was put on by the degree team from Fidelity tent No. 43, of Amity. State Commander J. W. Sherwood of Portland, and Deputies Wright and Graves were present, also over 40 visiting members from Newberg, Butteville, Greenville and Amity. A fine lunch was spread by the home tent, after which a number of speeches and toasts were made. Sir Knight T. A. White stated that he would give a free banquet to the members of Yamhill tent, No. 24, as soon as they reached the 100 mark. Tommy had better roll up his sleeves, for the goal is in sight and within easy reach, and the boys are wide awake and apt to be hungry.

The hop market is booming. It is believed a 15-cent market is in sight for those growers who are still holding. Last Friday Dick Phillips, J. H. Benson, Levi Bennett and George Briedwell of this county disposed of 200 bales to the Horst & Lachmund Co. of Salem at 12½ cents a pound. Manager L. L. Lachmund, of the company, in speaking of the condition of the hop market, said that his advices from the New York member of the firm, stated that Oregon hops in the New York market were selling at 17 cents; that the market was higher, with an upward tendency, and that hops were steadily advancing. There is a national shortage of 50,000 bales, and many brewers are buying from hand to mouth. Mr. Lachmund stated that there was no doubt but the remaining growers who are holding their hops now, will in a short time realize 15 cents a pound for their hops, if they will only hold on to them, as the brewers are compelled to purchase, and the great demand for the product, in both the domestic and foreign markets is such as to warrant the prediction of higher prices for the Oregon hops.

Transfers—How They Do It In Salt Lake City.

Women in Salt Lake City have some advantage over men when they come to patronize the street cars. In that haven of Mormonism they have a system of street railway transfers which is hard to beat. The passenger who receives a transfer from a Salt Lake conductor is compelled to use it himself or throw it away. Every ticket has printed on it, besides the usual hours and the names of intersecting lines, a row of seven small heads. Five of them are male heads, two are female. Of the male heads the first is a headless face, the second bears a mustache, the third "mutton chop" whiskers, the fourth a chin beard and the fifth is fully bearded. Beneath the row are two plus signs, with a forty between them. The conductor is required to identify each passenger by punching one of the faces and one of the signs for age, the first plus being used for young men, the forty for men of middle age, and the final plus for elderly men. Of the heads representing women one wears a hat and represents young women in general, and the other a bonnet for matrons. With really rare delicacy, the question of age is not mentioned in regard to female passengers.
