Wheat is reported weaker in Europe. In Portland sales passing are usually at \$1.25 or near so for valley, and no choice parcels are to be had at less. San Francisco same day \$1.33 3/4 @ 1.36 1/2 for No. 1 shipping. Chicago 75 @ 78 1/2. New York 87 1/2 @ 88 3/4. Liverpool spot 4s 4 1/2 d firm.
