FRENCH PINK.

Farmers who have successfully battled with this noxious weed inform the Independent that one cannot grow fall wheat and eradicate it. Fall plowing and spring sowing will in time exterminate it. Grain sown in the spring usually makes a good crop; in fact, is much more sure than that sown during the fall. In view of these facts, it seems to us a careful system of summer fallowing and spring sowing, should be adopted by farmers whose lands are running to French pink.

IT DID OCCUR.

San Francisco barely escaped the earthquake predicted six years ago as to follow the Charleston disaster. Capt. Plummer, of the steamer Mary Hume, which arrived in port Thursday reports that while about sixteen miles northwest of Point Reyes, at 1:20 o'clock on Wednesday afternoon, nine distinct shocks of earthquake were felt. The vibrations passed from north of east to south of west, and were accompanied by a deep rumbling sound, much like the distinct roar of cannon. The steamer was violently shaken and loose ropes and spars moved visibly. The vibrations passed to the west of San Francisco, and were not felt in the city.

FIREMEN'S TOURNAMENT.

Astoria won the wet test, but Salem secured the first "blud." Vancouver gets the next tournament. The first contest won by Tiger engine company of Salem over Rescues of Astoria, was for a steamer to run three hundred feet with not to exceed forty-five men on the rope; hose companies to run nine hundred feet, lay one hundred

feet of hose, break coupling, put on play pipe, and throw water. Time: Tigers, 54; Rescues, 55.1 seconds. In the next race for hook and ladder practice, Alerts of Salem ran against a picked team from Astoria. This race was for teams to run 600 feet with not more than thirty men on the ropes, and to put up a thirty-foot ladder within ten degrees of perpendicular in the street, and have a man ascend to the top. Abe Frazier climbed the ladder for Alerts, and Harry Hipple for Astorias. The race was gained by Alerts, as much by Frazier's excellent climbing as anything else, he ascending the ladder with the agility and rapidity of a jolly tar. Time: Alerts, 44 $\frac{3}{4}$; Astorias, 49 seconds. The interesting practice of the day was a hose contest for the Bowers purse. Hose company of twelve men to run two hundred yards to hydrant, attach and lay three hundred feet of hose, uncouple and screw on nozzle. Won by Astoria. Time: 51 $\frac{3}{8}$ seconds.
