### SMALL COIN.

The day of despising small things is forever past in Oregon. The price of the daily Reporter is two cents. In order to "make change" our Master Leonard will soon be supplied with the bronze coins. The secretary of the treasury has at length come to the conclusion to facilitate the circulation of minor coins. Nickels and bronzes are intrinsically, perhaps, worth no more in proportion than the Bland dollar. Still they are of the utmost advantage in retail sales, and for the want of them some portions of the country have suffered. They are really clamoring for cents and half dimes, but were recently informed that if they wanted those coins from the mint there were plenty of them, yet they would have to pay the cost of transportation to the places where they were to be used. The government, in an economical point of view, could not undertake to pay express charges. The acting secretary of the treasury department has now taken a new view of his duties in this particular, and determines to send out the coins wherever they are needed. On this coast, where the humble cent has long been despised, this boon may yet be discovered to be a real blessing. A community which compels itself to pay ten cents for an article of merchandise not worth more than one cent may boast that it does not care for trifles. Its extravagance is founded upon ignorance of the old principle, "Take care of the pence and the pounds will take care of themselves."
