Every few days Mr. Myers gives me a paper, which I take to the bank and get all the money, and then I pay the other men who work for me." Fred Schwatka has been heard from in his Alaskan expedition. July 26th his party got to a height of 17,020 feet above the sea level on Mount Elias, the highest climb above snow level ever made. One of his most important discoveries was an immense river emptying into Icy bay, a mere indentation of the coast sixty miles west of Yakutat bay. The stream is from a mile to a mile and half wide, 800 to a 1,000 yards of which is running water, the remainder being at low tide mud, sand and gravel. This great river is entirely too big in every way to be draining only the seaward slopes of the Mt. Elias mountains, from which it apparently comes. It must head far beyond the range, and break through them. Its muddy waters, from glaciers, discolor all the waters of Icy bay and for many miles out to sea. It was named Jones river.

Portland papers recently published an account of the death of a little girl who had been sent to one of the city hospitals from the vicinity of Oswego. The parents of the girl were poor people, and when she was taken violently sick with typhoid fever, in the absence of a neighborhood physician, sent to Portland for one. The only one who could be found to go demanded \$50 for three visits, which of course the poor people could not raise and therefore could have no physician. In their dire extremity their only recourse was the city hospital, where she was sent with hopes that the skillful treatment might save her life. But the hopes were vain as the removal was too much, and the poor child died crying pitifully for some hours before her death for her mother, who was left ill at home, and for whom there was not time to send ere dissolution took place. In view of the facts in this case is it not pertinent to inquire if humanity should not suggest that physicians attend the wants of such patients, even if their salaries be assured by the people.
