Judge Boise threw the gambling cases out of court in Salem. His grounds for this action were that the legislature has given the common council of the city of Salem exclusive power to regulate and suppress bawdy houses, gaming and gambling, and in the exercise of that power conferred by the legislature, the common council has passed an ordinance to prohibit gambling, and the city having assumed its exclusive jurisdiction over the offense of gambling, this excludes the jurisdiction of the state court. In rendering this decision, Judge Boise does not approve of gambling, nor stand in with the gentry that make their living by dishonesty and thieving. It is merely a question of law.
