Last week he was expelled untiring in his efforts to make this from a county school, near Turlock, on account of his wonderful freaks. The Brough family refused to have anything to do with him, believing him possessed of a devil. The boy was taken by a farmer and sent to school. This is without doubt its of our wares. We know the best exhibition of minerals ever made in the United States, and is probably only one of many others to be made in the future. Countless specimens of gold quartz and nuggets, silver, copper, cinnabar, cobalt, lead, iron and coal are shown, and presented for inspection in the best possible manner. S. G.
