THE APPROACHING WARS.

We feel compelled to say that at this moment the continent of Europe, from head to foot, seems broken out all over with the scarlet rash of international hatred. France, Germany, Italy, Austria and Russia are to be the chief combatants, and Russia seems about ready to make the first move on the checkerboard of nations. Bulgaria has just declared with great vehemence of suffrage, that Russia must remove her meddling hand; France says that England must get out of Egypt; Germany is expecting an attack from Russia on one side and France on the other; Slav and Teuton can no longer keep belligerent hands off of each other. If England stays out of the general fight, it will be only because of the report that she is entirely unprepared and that war would to her be nothing but calamity. The Danes are ready for the insurrection against their own government, and you can not put the tip of your finger on the map of Europe without touching a threatened territory. Nothing but 3,000 miles of ocean can keep us out of the fight, and great wisdom at Washington will be necessary, or somehow, in some of the unexpected questions that may arise, our country will be involved. When the sword starts the plow stops, and the harvest fields of Europe will become a pasture ground for the cavalry horses, and be gullied with the heavy wheels of the supply train. Unless the preventing hand of Providence interferes there be great demand for our breadstuffs and the work of our factories, but who can look with any satisfaction upon a prosperity for our nation which shall be built on the woes of other nations? In spite of the dispatches, we still think it too late in the history of the world for civilization to go back to barbarism and continental cutthroatery. The world never had in it so much great statesmanship as now, and surely there ought to be enough capacity coming out from St. Petersburg and Berlin, Rome, Paris and London into some immediate congress of nations to settle by consolidation and treaty that which the unsheathed swords of Europe are about to settle in massacre. Our voice is for peace.

It is rumored that Michael Davitt, the Irish patriot, is about to be married to Miss Yore, an Oakland heiress. Mrs. Cornelia M. Stewart, wife of the late millionaire dry goods merchant A. T. Stewart, died suddenly at her residence in New York city on Sunday. In response to renewed and pressing appeals, Sir Charles Dilke has finally and emphatically declined to re enter public life "until he has disproved gross and unjust calumnies against

him," to which object, he says, his whole life will be devoted.

The Albany Bulletin passes censure on the jury of Marion county that acquitted Miss Mattie Allison of complicity in the killing of Campbell. It regards her as the instigator of a crime that laid one man in his grave and sent another to the gallows.

See what it is to be a great man. Gladstone gets stung by a wasp and the fact is heralded by telegraph all over the English speaking world. Naturally the story grows to such an extent that Gladstone himself is forced to take notice of it and telegraph the exact truth of the matter.

A Vienna paper has a telegram from Sofia saying that the Russian partisans there have received a report that two Russian frigates have arrived at Varna. The Bulgarian government puts no faith in the report and considers that it was invented with the object of intimidating the people.

The disposition of the thrifty temperance farmers of Iowa, as noted by the World's correspondent, to be willing to sell their corn to local distilleries, provided the whisky is sold outside the state, reminds one of the virtue of the woman who experienced religion at a revival. "Finding that my jewelry was dragging me down to hell," she remarked, "I took it off and gave it to my sister."

We do not find fault with Mr. George for crying out against the misuse of illgotten wealth, nor for protesting against the real oppression of the poor. But we think it is wrong to mark the difference between property honestly acquired and property dishonestly obtained, chiefly from franchise or special privileges voted by legislative bodies that were corrupted to grant to private greed what should have been bestowed with a view to the public good.

The Telegram informs us that Cecil Beebe, the defaulting clerk of G. Shindler & Co., has been brought back to his old home, and now occupies a felon's cell in the Multnomah county jail. His immediate companions are two horse thieves and a murderer. It is well that Mr. Beebe did not succeed in remaining in foreign lands. He is now learning, what he apparently failed to have learned before, that a crime committed by a gilt-edged dude is none the less a crime, and that a prison, like Love, levels all ranks.

There is a little better feeling to-day in wheat circles. Advices generally of good tenor, and a better feeling is manifest. Portland may be quoted rather better than at the close of last week, most recent transactions being at a slight advance. For choice valley \$1.25 has been paid, and is now quoted for desirable parcels, although the figure is deemed too high by some. It is understood that this limit went out Saturday. If so, and advices do not weaken, it must be the ruling figure. For Walla Walla \$1.15@1.16½ is freely named, the extreme for round lots. Exporters having ships without wheat, or wheat without ships, are working against each other, and this helps the prices. Receipts continue liberal and there is no scarcity of loading stuff.

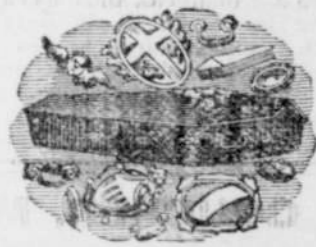
