### Challenge.

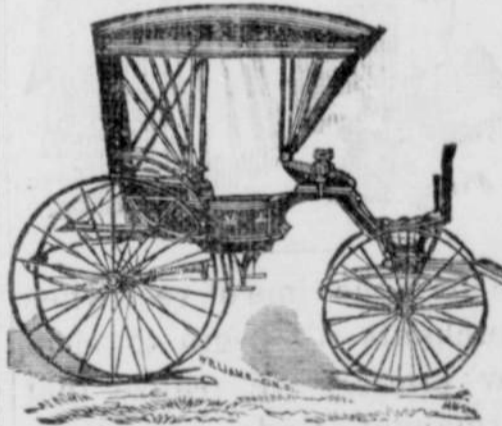
