Ring for the Oregonian! this is a chestnut. Miss Rose Cleveland wants her salary as editor increased to \$500 a month. She is getting \$300 now. Many a writer is doing better work at \$25 a week, but then it is supposed to be worth a good deal to be sister to the president of the United States. So a Rose by any other name probably wouldn't do as well, for this particular purpose.

Whatever may have been the motive of a New York newspaper in paying the bill of the embalmers who preserved Gen. Grant's body, it was natural to suppose that the payment would cut short the unseemly posthumous scandal which had broken out. Instead of this, it seems to have had an effect precisely opposite. The scandal has taken a new lease of life, and seems to approach very near to blackmail. Example made of some of the parties to it by a prosecution through the regular machinery of criminal procedure might spare surviving relatives of great men a good deal of trouble in the future.

Gen. Booth of the Salvation Army was originally an Episcopalian, but was afterward converted to Methodism. A correspondent says that he is a veritable autocrat and despot. He is supreme, and from his decision there is no appeal. The funds subscribed are sent him personally. He has no council nor treasurer. The officers are allowed to draw sufficient only for bare existence and clothing. The United States branch of the army is almost confined at present to cities north of Washington, but has at present two branches among the colored people of the South. At present the "General" can boast of numbering among his followers an ex-Buddist priest, Indian judges, American red men, Chinese, Japanese, Hindoos, Turks and dead beats.

A. E. LaRocque has begun improvements on his ranch near Butteville, Marion county, and will put it in shape for tilling next year. It is the largest farm in the county, comprising over 900 hundred acres of land in a body. The farm has been neglected for a number of years and is in a wretched state of wreck and ruin, buildings decayed, fences gone, and the place almost a waste. Mr. LaRocque will expend about \$10,000 in the improvement, and bring it back to its place among the best farms on the coast. There is still standing, though in feeble condition, a modest dwelling built forty years ago by Mr. LaRocque's father. It will probably be allowed to stand as a monument of pioneer venture, until the ravages of time obliterates it.
