## EDITORIAL NOTES.

Job Connor, the United States grand juror missing in Portland, was found sick at the residence of a Mr. Burnell, in Washington county. He was taken home by his friends.

Gov. Moody has issued a proclamation calling for a special election of representative in Multnomah county to fill the vacancy resulting from the resignation of D. W. Taylor, on Tuesday Nov. 23d.

A judge and several reputable people went to a prominent legal firm on account of Cecil Beebe's father's good name, and offered to pay all expenses for defending the son, but the unfortunate young man refused assistance, and on Saturday pleaded guilty to embezzlement.

The Oregon exhibit car, fitted up and placed in charge of granger Buick of the Roseburg Plaindealer, will reach home to day and be laid up for the winter. Mr. Buick, in a letter to the Plaindealer expresses regret that he was not enabled to take the car into New England to show what Oregon, the Massachusettes of the Pacific, can produce. We regret it, too, for it was our last chance.

Many people will believe that in the hanging of Sproule, the American, at Victoria last week an innocent man was made to suffer for the crime of some person unknown. It was what is called a strong case of circumstantial evidence. Sproule was, unfortunately, a man very much interested from a pecuniary point of view, in the death of Thomas Hammill, and it was that fact principally, that secured his conviction.

C.B. Carlisle speaks as follows of his alleged appointment as postmaster of East Portland: "Why, it's all a joke. I am not an applicant for the place and would not qualify if I was appointed. It might be," he continued, "that this report is true, having grown out of a letter I wrote to a relative of mine, Senator Carlisle, shortly after Cleveland's election, and jokingly said, in speaking of what offices I wanted, that I would take either the governorship of Alaska or the East Portland postoffice." In answer to what he intended to do in case the report was true, he said: "Well, I would not care to insult the administration by refusing to qualify, and would have to get out of it the best I could."

The sentence of Cecil Beebe will be somewhat lighter because of his plea. His trial would indeed have been a sad one confronted by witnesses who had been his schoolmates, prosecuted by the district attorney who was also his schoolmate, and tried before the judge who also attended school in the same city, when he did, and a jury who probably knew him from childhood, and who see the respected name of his father, an early pioneer, smirched by a son upon whom he lavished everything that was needed to make him an upright man.

The Newport News thinks it looks as though the owners of the sea tramp Sardony; wanted to lose her for the insurance. The ship was in a helpless condition, and Capt. Winant could only assist by going back to Yaquina, which was the nearest port, and sending out a tug, which he offered to do. The captain of the steamer declined, and thought he would be all right if he could only get off-shore twenty or thirty miles. On returning to Yaquina, Capt. Winant immediately telegraphed to the agents in San Francisco the situation of the vessel, but received no answer; and as this was the nearest point from which assistance could be rendered, it looks a little as though they did not care whether she went ashore or not.
