NEWS AND NOTES.

Texans are preparing for a border raid upon Mexico.

The Chicago strikers have nearly all applied for work at their old places, upon the order of Powderly.

Dwyer Bros., the somewhat noted Brooklyn turf men, have won \$208,-549.16 this year. The largest winning by any one stable in America. Their expenses nearly equal winnings.

The contractors of the switchback over the Cascade mountains, are cut ting a ditch six hundred feet long. seventy-five feet wide and eight feet deep, so as to drain Green river channel in order to obviate the necessity of building a bridge. Work on the switchback is progressing favorably. It is now thought that trains will be running over the mountains by the first of the year.

In spite of all that has been said, work has not been commenced at Newport upon the government jetty. It is certainly inexcusable. It was contemplated that the work should commence immediately after the appropriation was granted. The funds were made available for that purpose. The work is urgent to save that already done from destruction. Commerce is suffering from the delay. The weather has been uniformly mild and pleasant, and yet nothing has been done. There has been no satisfactory reason given why the work has been delayed, and when congress meets our delegation will probably make some inquiry concerning the matter.
