The attention of the legislature will be called to the enormous catch, during the past season of the fish wheels of the Columbia. Tons of small fish that escaped the nets of the fisherman of the lower river were taken by these wheels. The profits of one of these for the past season is given at \$32,000. This sum, taken in connection with the fact that the fishing season is limited to four months, and that the capital invested in the machine that throws out the fish is but a few hundred dollars, is enormous.
