Following are latest particulars concerning the stranding of the Carmarthen Castle, off Nestucca. All of the crew succeeded in getting ashore alive, although many of them were pretty badly used up. The ship came ashore a little south of Shortridge camp grounds, on the beach, on the 4th, she tisted over seaward. The sea is making clear breach over all the deck gear and the vessel is washing in shore. The storm was a very sudden and severe one for this part of the coast. The crew were taken care of by Messrs. Shortridge, J. & S. H. Rock, James Upton and L. Bosley. They left for Portland yesterday. From present appearance there is no hope to save the ship.

* J. M. Grubbs, of Willamina, has a valuable horse which has been almost blind for two weeks. He stands most of the time with his eyes shut, and hot water runs from them continually. For awhile there was a light-blue scum that covered the whole eye, but that appears to have left to some extent. The horse is in good condition and eats as heartily as he ever did. He wants somebody to suggest a cure. The Rural Spirit says it is a simple attack of ophthalmia, brought about by some irritation to the eye. Put him on a cooling diet, that is keep him on a short diet; keep him in a dark, well ventilated stall until his eye is better, then lighten up the stall. Bathe the eye well three time a day with warm water and put a little lotion into the eye after the bathing composed of five grains of sulphate of zinc and fifteen drops of tincture belladonna to the ounce of water.
