How "Defaulters" Are Made.

It was recently announced by authority that Dr. McGillicuddy, late Indian agent at Pine Ridge, Daktoa, had been put on the democratic list of government defaulters. As this case fairly illustrates the process of manufacturing "defaulters" out of honest men and capable officials it is worth while to state it somewhat in detail. Among the various amounts charged to the ex-agent at Pine Ridge is an item of \$7.50. It appears from a reliable statement that in June last four Indian pupils in an eastern government school were sent home sick. One died on the way, and Dr. McGillicuddy was telegraphed to send to the nearest railroad point "transportation for three Indians and a corpse." He hired a man and team for the service, and filed his voucher, but the department officials have rejected the item on these grounds: 1. They want evidence that the charge of \$7.50 for driving sixty miles and transporting three Indians and a corpse on a hot June day was not excessive. 2. The agent had not previously obtained authori-

zation from the department for that expense. Does not this reveal a perfect bonanza of business sense. Another item charged against Dr. McGillicuddy is \$500. The explanation of this is that he was instructed to build a school house at a cost not to exceed \$500. The agent let the contract after due advertisement for bids, and the house was built complete in every respect for the \$500. This account has been rejected for the reason that there was not appended a sworn account and receipt from every man who worked on the job or furnished material for the building. Of course the agent had no connection with the men employed by the contractor, and they are scattered far and wide. There are several other items, but the above are average samples. Isn't it a great blessing to live in the era of reform?
