## How "Defaulters" Are Made.

It was recently announced by authority that Dr. McGillicuddy late Indian agent at Pine Ridge Daktoa, had been put on the democratic list of government defaulters. He hired a man and team for the service, and filed his voucher, but the department officials have rejected the item on these grounds: 1.
