"America for Americans."

In his thanksgiving sermon at Metropolitan church, Rev. Dr. Newman while disclaiming any desire to revive know-nothingism or any sympathy with that defunct party, declared that this country is for Americans, not for Germans, nor Irishmen, nor Englishmen, nor Frenchmen, nor any others of foreign birth; but for intellectual, moral, industrious, upright man, whencesoever he comes. The doctor defined any man, no matter where born, as an American who embraces the ideas and principles which distinguish this country from all others. An American citizen, he said, must believe in personal liberty, renounce all alliance to every foreign prince and potentate; must oppose all alliance of church and state, be ready to sacrifice to maintain the government what the forefathers did to establish it; must believe in Christianity and the Sabbath day. Every priest, monk and friar, he said, might become an American citizen, but he must renounce all allegiance to the pope. The reverend doctor regards immigration as the danger which threatens the future of our country. He declared

there had been a vast change for the worse in the character of immigrants. In 1900, he said, fourteen years from now, there will be, at the present rate of immigration, 19,000,000 persons of foreign birth in this land, and counting their children of the first generation, the number will reach 43,000,000. He wanted to know what the country will do with them. As a remedy for the danger he would recommend that the naturalization laws be changed so as to require a residence of fifteen years before a foreigner can vote; also that no foreign language be taught in the schools and that no law be printed anywhere, in any language except the English. He vigorously protested against the "Irish vote," the "German vote," etc., and denounced the politician who appeals to such distinctions. All we want, he declared, is the American vote. At the close of the address the congregation decided to have it printed.

Idaho wants to be annexed to something, it isn't particular what, so that geographical requirements are observed. Southern Idaho thinks that Nevada would be a good state to form a part of; eastern Idaho leans toward Montana; northern and western Idaho is inclined to join fortunes with Washington. The territory contains 60,000 people, and would have its best interest promoted by annexation to Washington.

A cable message says the Queen of England has decorated Prince Alexander with the order of the Baths. No doubt he needed it badly, and the old lady should be highly commended for motherly forethought in her old age; it is a pity says the East Oregonian, that Lord Colin Campbell had not had some good old woman to look after him and decorate him with a bath when he needed it. Probably then he would not have been guilty of such nastiness as has been developed against him in the divorce case between himself and wife, reports if which are now filling the public prints, and shocking the people of both England and America.

King Hubert, of Italy, has sent to President Cleveland a copy of the edition of Dante recently printed for Victor Emmanuel, Italian prince royal. A very suggestive gift.
