The County Seat Relocation.

Following is the bill introduced into the house by Hon. R. R. Laughlin, Jan. 11th, and read first time:

Sec. 1. That on the first Monday of June, A. D. 1887, being the first Monday in June next succeeding the passage of this act, the legal voters of Yamhill county, state of Oregon, shall vote upon the question of relocating the county seat of said Yamhill county. The poll books for said election shall be ruled and prepared so as to provide a sufficient number of columns for recording and counting all the votes cast for relocating the county seat of said Yamhill county.

Sec. 2. Each voter voting upon the question of relocating the said county seat shall have written or printed upon his ballot the name of the place for which he votes for county seat, and the place receiving a majority of all the legal votes cast for county seat, shall be the permanent county seat of said Yamhill county until otherwise provided by law.

Sec. 3. If no one of the places voted for at said election as provided in secs. 1 and 2 of this act shall receive a majority of all the legal votes cast for county seat at said election, then at the next general election, to wit: On the first Monday of June, A. D. 1888, the question shall, under this act, be again voted upon by the voters of said Yamhill county, for the purpose of relocating the county seat thereof, at which election the two places having the highest number of legal votes at the first election shall be voted upon for county seat; and the county clerk of said county shall prepare and rule, or have so prepared and ruled, the poll books for said election, so as to provide a column for recording and counting the votes cast for each place voted for, and the place receiving the highest number of legal votes cast for county seat at said election shall be the permanent county seat of said county of

Yamhill, and state of Oregon, until otherwise provided by law.

Sec. 4. That any legal voter of said Yamhill county desiring to vote upon said question at either of said elections, shall vote in the precinct wherein he would vote, if voting for county officers of said county, and not elsewhere.

Sec. 5. If the legal voters of said county shall change the location of said county seat from Lafayette to some other point in said county, then in that case, within months after the holding of said election so changing such location, and on the first day of January next following said election, so deciding said question, and thereafter all county business, together with the holding of all courts of record for such county, shall be transacted and held at the new county seat, and all the county records shall be moved within said time and on or before said date, to the new county seat.

Sec. 6. Should the legal voters of said county decide to change the location of said county seat, and should the same be relocated at some other point than where the same now is, the county court of said county shall not have the power or authority to contract for or construct public buildings to exceed the cost of \$45,000, and shall not have power or authority to levy any tax upon the property of said county, in excess of two mills on the dollar of the taxable property of said county, annually, for said purpose.

Sec. 7. Inasmuch as the question of relocation of said county seat is to be voted upon soon, and inasmuch as it is a matter of much public concern in said county, this act shall take effect from and after its approval by the governor.

An amendment was offered yesterday to section 5, which provides substantially, that if the legal voters decide to change the location of the county seat from Lafayette to some other place; then, within two years after such change shall be voted, and at such time as the county court, setting to transact county business shall direct, by an order entered upon its journal, cause the same to be done, etc., due notice of which change shall be given, by publication of said order for four weeks, in some paper published in said county.

The End of the Crazy Quilt Furore.

The crazy quilt furore is at an end, and women whose intellect has not been irretrievably wrecked by its intricacies are now turning their attention to the kind of patchwork known as Noah's ark. The quilt is of serge, cloth, satin sheeting, or plain cream sheeting, or, in fact, anything. The Noah's ark is rather above the center, and the various animals are, of course, arranged "two by two, the elephant and kangaroo," round and round the entire quilt in such a way as to form a design. Scraps of fur and embroidery of silk and wool with cross stitch and outline, or in what is known to art workers as couching, are all used in the same piece of work. Of course, much more ingenuity is required than in the crazy quilt, without which it would be a dismal failure. And there is a question whether any of these quilts, involving such an outlay of labor, pays.
