Ireland, were appointed a committee on constitution and by-laws: The following preamble was adopted: We the undersigned, desiring to promote the commercial, manufacturing and general interests of Yamhill county, and the city of McMinnville, and feeling the necessity of co-operation in all these matters, do hereby associate ourselves together as a board of trade for said city. It is quite a trick to jump off a train going say at thirty miles an hour, and the Americans take a pride in cultivating the dexterity. The way to jump is always with the train and always on the left hand side of the latter letting the right foot rest on the step and the left foot swung from the step.
