Christopher Buckley, the noted democratic boss, is lying dangerously ill at his home in San Francisco.

The striking car drivers of San Francisco have incorporated an omnibus line with a capital of \$10,000.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Voohees occurred this morning. The remains were interred at Highland Lawn, in the Voorhees burial plot.

One of the most unprovoked murders ever committed took place in San Francisco on the 24th. The victim was Wm. Hayes and murderer his son, Daniel.

The Indiana democrats are pushing the Hill boom with lusty sinews. N. B.—Indiana is one of the two or three states in which all the "rascals" have been bounced.

Henry Watterson, of the Louisville Courier-Journal, is in New York. His mission is to persuade the democratic leaders here to get up a great mass meeting at the Academy of music in favor of tariff for revenue only.

The burning of the largest distillery in Indiana—which is said to be the largest in the world—will not deprive the belligerent democrats at Indianapolis of ammunition for the pending war. There are about fifteen railroads centering at the Hoosier capital.

There was great jubilation at Gloucester last night over the passage of the retaliatory fisheries bill by the senate. A large crowd assembled in the vicinity of the custom house and post-office, blocking the street and awakening echoes with frequent cheers and other manifestations of enthusiasm.

News of the World.

Senor Antonio Fortes, repeatedly Portugese prime minister, is dead.

The senate rejected the woman suffrage question, by a vote of 16 to 34.

"He died with clean hands and an empty purse" is the New York Worlds announcement for Logan.

A St. Petersburg dispatch says the czar and czarina are arranging for a tour of Europe in the spring.

The semi-panic on the stock exchange, caused by the London Daily News article of yesterday, has subsided.

Gen. Boulanger, minister of war, publishes a denial of the report that he is buying horses abroad for the use of the army.

The National woman's suffrage association met in Washington on the 25th, Susan B. Anthony delivered the opening address.

The trial of John O'Neill, the third of the indicted alderman of the "boodle" board of 1881, was begun on the 26th in New York.

Gladstone arrived in London to-day. At the stations along the road from Hawarden he was reconized by the people and enthusiastically cheered.

At the cabinet council held at Windsor to-day the queen read and approved the speech to be delivered from the throne at the opening of parliament Thursday.

Three thousand miners at Airdeye, Scotland, have struck for advance of a shilling per day. The strike has occasioned excitement among the colliers throughout Scotland.

The Gazette pronounces the declaration of the London Daily News, that Germany intended to demand certain explanations from the French regarding the movement of troops on the frontier, as a pure invention.

Newspapers of all parties join in accusing the English press of inventing and circulating bellicose canards. The French journals assert that the English newspaper men are engaged in this alleged work from pecuniary motives.

The ice in the creek broke last night and gorged at Hawley, Pa. The lower part of the village was flooded and the Erie round house had water in it four feet deep, putting out the fires in all the engines. The gorge gave way at noon to-day and the water rapidly receded.

Two ballots were taken for United States senator on the 26th, at Indianapolis, without change.

Vanderpool, war correspondent of the Paris Figaro, who served that paper in the Russo-Turkish and other campaigns, and who is at present in Berlin, received a cablegram from the Figaro to-day, saying that war is imminent and inevitable, and ordering him to sail for Paris not later than February 1st.

Senator Dolph said in the senate in reply to the woman suffrage question: "God speed the day when, not only in all the states and territories, but everywhere, women shall stand before the law freed from the shackles riveted on her by tyranny and by ignorance, not only in relation to suffrage, but in relation to every other right."
