**Editorial Notes.**

High license is taking the place of prohibition rapidly. Our wish that whiskey may be taxed up to 50 cents a drink may yet be fulfilled. The Pennsylvania legislature is considering a bill fixing the license tax in cities of the first class at \$600; of the second, third and fourth class, \$500; townships and boroughs, of twenty thousand inhabitants, \$400. There are strong probabilities that it will pass. Senator Watts, has framed a bill which is to take the place of and supply the defects of the Keady law. The provisions of the bill are about the same as those of the Keady bill, except that \$500 is the price to be paid for a license instead of \$300; and the consent of a majority of the voters of any precinct has to be obtained before the county court can issue a license to sell liquor. Incorporated towns are not included in the provisions of the act, which is all the objection we find to the bill.

Representative Hermann got his bristles up about post office discriminations against Oregon, and spoke somewhat hotly about it. He may rest assured that democrats as well as republicans will stand to his back when such demagogism as "economy" in this matter is made use of to defraud Oregon people of reasonable mail facilities. He insisted that every American community is entitled to reasonable mail facilities, regardless of expense, and if his request for additional service was not granted, he should feel compelled to place the department on trial before congress and demand an investigation.
