General Mission.

Beginning Sunday Feb. 13, a series of mission services will be conducted at St. James church,

The mission will be in charge of the Rev. John W. Sellwood, of east Portland, assisted by the Rev. A. L. Parker, of Eugene city; Rev. Charles Booth, of Corvallis; and the rector, Rev. John C. Fair. Services will be usual services on Sunday at 11 a. m. and 7 p. m. Sunday school at 9:30 a. m., at which the rector will officiate. Monday holy communion at 11 a. m. a service for believers, at 4 p. m. for children; at 7 p. m. mission service. The clergy will arrive on Monday to assist in the services of that day, and the remaining services of the mission. Due notice will be given of the services for each day through the papers. All are cordially invited to come to the mission.

Washington news is very important. The senate appropriation bill increases the house bill, and gives for river improvements, etc., \$600,000. Senator Gorman was the most outspoken of non-resident senators for liberal appropriations. The exceptionally large increase for the mouth of the Columbia was secured largely through his influence. He holds that by far the largest single appropriation should be applied at this point. When the item for a boat railway at the Dalles was reached, at Dolph's suggestion, Mitchell was invited to appear before the committee and state his views of the measure. After he withdrew the committee authorized the Oregon senators to prepare such an amendment as they desired to submit for a survey of the Dalles and for an appropriation therefor of \$15,000, and promised that it should be incorporated in the bill.
