A bill repealing the act for the protection of Mongolian pheasants passed the house last Saturday. These birds take kindly to this climate and multiply with astonishing rapidity. They are great gourmands and are very destructive to grain. In response to a demand from farmers of Linn and Marion counties the bill withdrawing the protection of the law from them was introduced, and when it became known that the Portland rod and gun club were opposed to the repeal, the bill readily passed.

Mr. Daly of Polk county is right in asking the insurance companies to contribute something for the benefit of fireman. Life and limb are endangered time and time again by the brave boys, and thousands upon thousands of dollars of property are annually saved by them. Why not therefore recognize their services and afford them this means of further increasing their efficiency? The plan has been successfully adopted in other and older states, and it is worthy of commendation and adoption in Oregon.

Hon. W. T. Burney, register at the Oregon city land office says there are patents in his office which were issued from the government over twenty-five years ago; and others issued at various dates since then, numbering about 1,500. These patents should be had by the owners and put on record in the proper county offices. In order to obtain the delivery of a patent the certificate receipt issued from the land office for the claim must be surrendered. If the certificate or receipt has been lost or destroyed the patent will be delivered upon the affidavit, setting forth ownership of the land; the fact as to the loss of the certificate, etc., and that he makes the affidavit for the purpose of obtaining the patent for said land. Parties in making inquiry in relation to patents should state the name of the patentee and the location by section, township and range of the land.

### A Sign of Returning Reason.

House bill 18, introduced by Laughlin, to relocate the county seat of Yamhill, passed the house last week, and was read the first time in the senate. The bill will pass the senate (with a slight amendment) and then be returned to the house for a new deal. This question should be settled, and the citizens of this place are willing to leave it to the legal voters of the county, whether the county seat shall be moved to McMinnville, or remain where it is.

There is no doubt but that the house will concur in the amendment of the senate to house bill 18, fixing the time for the special election in November, and thus deferring the question five months; provided there is sufficient time to reach it. The session will close next Friday evening.
