EDITOR REPORTER:

The report of the proceedings of the legislature in the Oregonian in reference to the Leinenweber election as one of the Pilot-commissioners places me in a wrong light. I neither heard, knew, or cared whether he was what some persons call a "Mitchell man" or not. I have always held, as a principle, that where judges of elections, pilot commissioners or any other position where three persons were to be selected, one should be of the minority party. My position was well known to many members of the legislature. I voted for Leinenweber because I was in possession in evidence that satisfied me that he was honest, and thoroughly qualified for the position. And also because he was the unanimous choice of the democratic members of the legislature. The election of Leinenweber was discussed a good deal by the members and I never heard of its being considered as an endorsement of any one, and I don't know that it would have made any difference with my vote if I had. I would have supported any other democrat, possessing the same qualifications, if he had been selected by the democratic members. I was not "duped" in supporting Leinenweber and have neither regrets nor apologies, and believe that I properly represent the voters of Yamhill county.
