### Lecture.

The Rev. John C. Fair will lecture to-night at St. James church at 7:30. Subject: "What is Religion?" In the lectures which are to follow an attempt will be made to insist upon some of the truths which are most fundamentally related to the souls religious life as they come in contact with some forms of modern thought. Father White left the city yesterday to attend the funeral of Rt. Rev. Father Blanch at Vancouver at 11 a. m. to-day. Father B. died at Vancouver on the 25th, at the advanced age of 90 years. He was one of the pioneer missionaries of this coast and came here at a time when Oregon was a synonym for wilderness and Washington, Idaho and Montana territories were unnamed and unknown.
