To make your lamp chimney tough, put it in your cook stove reservoir while the water is cold and let it remain there all day and the following night, when it will cool slowly. Don't cut your lamp wicks; rub off the charred end with a match.

The following is a sure cure for chilblains: Take a handful of dried peach leaves and pour boiling water on them, and let them stand till cool enough not to burn the patient; then place the feet in the water fifteen minutes. Do this two or three times and it will effect a cure. If you cannot get the dried peach leaves, plain water will do as well.
