### Old Horse Sales.

The sale of old horse goods at the depot in this city soon, reminds us of the old horse sale of the millionaire Stewart's wife. Mrs. Stewart couldn't take her wealth with her when she died, but at least she could show her stupendous respect for money by providing for the sale of her effects, even down to her stockings and wigs. Most persons when they come to die, have friends on whom to bestow personal goods as an evidence of affection; but Mrs. Stewart had too much respect for the value of things to make gratuitous distribution of her personal articles. She shows her affection for her relatives and dearest friends by allowing them to bid at auction for her dresses and silk stockings and her shoes and her jewels. These things are now spread out for exhibition at the Stewart mansion, and in a few days an auctioneer will mount a table and offer them to the highest bidder among her relatives and friends, all others being excluded. That the shrewd old women who adored the dollar knew that these articles would bring more than their cost may be assumed. To possess an article that belonged to a woman of such magnificent and unused wealth, will be an object of ambition. Even her gray wigs are to be sold, and will bring a price. Perhaps to that old woman there was an immense satisfaction in knowing that nobody would get anything from her without paying for it. Among her jewels are many articles that belonged to her family before she was married, and came to her as presents, and these the family will be allowed to keep; if they outbid others. This is certainly one of the strangest spectacles the world has ever seen. She leaves millions to the care of Judge Hilton and it is not known or believed that the Stewart wealth was designed by her to do any great thing for humanity. The sale of her personal effects at auction can be accounted for only on the theory of her immense respect for money.

### Wheat Prospects.

For a month past there has been much speculation in wheat. The bulls and bears have lost and won great odds alternately. In this county the growing crop is fine. The statistician of the United States agricultural department, says the area of winter wheat appears to be nearly the same as that of last year. There will be some reduction of area in the south, and possibly a slight decline in some of the more northern Atlantic states. In the west and south west a small increase with a few exceptions. In the west the crop is looking better than in the south. It is generally very promising in Ohio, especially early sown. Not quite so good in west Virginia and Kentucky. The Michigan area went into snowbound quarters in good condition. Growth in the best soils in Indiana were quite vigorous in November, and the whole breadth has a promising appearance. In Illinois the soil was rather dry at seeding time, and drying winds were unfavorable to germination, yet much of the area was in excellent condition when snow covered it. An average promise is apparent in Missouri. In Kansas the climate was too dry for best appearance, and wheat suffers somewhat in consequence, Drouth retarded sowing in Oregon, while in California little seeding was done up to December 1st.

The death of Judge McKee of California has changed the plans of President Cleveland, with respect to the appointment of commissioners under the inter-state commerce bill. With Judge McKee on the National commission, and his son E. D. on the Oregon state commission, we should feel a sense of security. Judge McKee was a man of unimpeachable character and a high legal reputation. He has been on the bench of California for near a quarter of a century. His sons residing in Portland, E. D. and Robert; the latter a lawyer and the former representing the shipping house of Meyer, Wilson & Co. are now in California, in consequence of the death of their father.

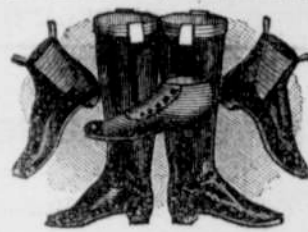
