I was in court when a colored man was being tried for killing another colored man, and, on asking why his jury was wholly white, was told that he was given the choice of being tried by his own color or by whites, and he chose the whiteswisely, it seemed to me, as he got off with seven years' sentence, instead of life or worse. While listening to the trial of this case every one, excepting a very few, hastened out of the court room and down stairs, and in a few moments filed back into their places. The judge remarked: "Gentlemen, the shock is past, and we will proceed with the case." Yet I had not felt any jar or tremor, but both white and black natives are very sensitive regarding earthquakes; the one manifests it by fear, and the other by nightly prayer meetings ever since the great shock. At Morganton I was told that the colored churches had not been closed since the latter event, and that meetings were held every night in the week .- Raleigh Cor. Boston Transcript.
