WESTERN.

LYNCHERS ARRESTED.

The Leader of the Polk County Mob Arrested at North Yamhill.

LAFAYETTE, July 21.—This morning Sheriff Graves of Polk county came down to this place, and in company with Sheriff Harris of Yamhill county, and a Portland detective, went out near North Yamhill and arrested Abe Blackburn. It is claimed that Blackburn was the leader of the party that lynched Oscar Kely at Dallas. It is also said that he did not wear any mask at the time of the lynching and that he has been identified as being the leader of the gang. No further arrests have been made in this county. Mr. Blackburn is a man with a family.

TAKEN TO SALEM.

SALEM, July 21.—This evening Sheriff Graves of Polk county brought to this city and lodged in jail Abe Blackburn, of North Yamhill, who was arrested near that place this morning charged with complicity in the lynching of Oscar Kely on the morning of July 7. Blackburn has been positively identified by Harry Depew, Kely's guard, as the unmasked man who entered the jail at the head of half a dozen others after breaking down the outside door, and compelled him to unlock the cell in which the murderer was confined. Other people saw Blackburn and four companions riding south toward Polk county, between McMinnville and Carlton, on the evening of July 6, and they were seen returning on the morning of July 7. These and other clues serve to establish almost unmistakably the identity of Blackburn as active leader of the party which hanged Kely. Twelve others of the mob are known.

Blackburn is an ordinary looking man of about 40 years, rather below the medium height, of sandy complexion, with chin beard and moustache. He is now a farmer, but was formerly a member of the firm of Blackburn & Peckham, dealers in general merchandise and warehouse men, which failed a year since under cloudy circumstances. Peckham has left the country, probably because he feared prosecution for crooked work in the failure. Litigation is now pending between Yamhill county and Portland creditors of the bankrupt firm concerning the property which was assigned, upon the failure, to the latter.

When arrested, Blackburn

took matters coolly, but afterwards, evidently becoming alarmed, vigorously denied to the sheriff that he was the ring leader of the mob. He was taken to Dallas, arraigned before Justice Frink on a charge of murder, and held without bail for examination next Tuesday, and then brought to Salem.

There has been some talk about a band of 200 "rescuers," who were sworn to release from the custody of the officers at the proper time, any of the lynching party who had been arrested. Whether such "brotherhood" will at any time attempt to rescue Blackburn from the Marion county jail and from the custody of a man of the well-known alertness and determination of Sheriff Minto, remains to be seen, but the rumor of such organization is probably idle talk.

EASTERN.

Fifteen Laborers Killed and Many Injured by an Express Train.

NEW YORK, July 21.—A gang of Italian laborers were at work ballasting on the Erie railway on a sharp curve about three-fourths of a mile above Hoboken. The Chicago express was an hour late and rushed round the curve before the men had the slightest warning and dashed through them, killing twelve or fifteen on the spot and wounding many others. The shrieks of the victims were heartrending. When the train slowed up the track presented a sickening sight, being covered with mangled bodies, the rails splashed with blood and broken limbs, while pieces of ragged flesh were scattered in all directions. Some bodies were mangled beyond description and crushed out of all semblance of humanity. To most of the victims death must have come instantaneously, but some of them appeared to be yet quivering and life ebbing away when the train was brought to a standstill. There was only fifteen minutes' delay, and the train which had wrought so much disaster proceeded on its way from Allendale to Hoboken.
