TROUT PLANTED BY PLANE

Extensive use of an airplane to release trout in otherwise inaccessible lakes has been successfully done by the Oregon State Game Commission this year. Thirty-five lakes in the Cascades were stocked by this method during the summer.

A tank was fitted to the under side of the plane. The tank was equipped with an aereating device and a flap type hinged door that was sealed on a watertight gasket. In actual liberation the pilot would pass over the edge of a lake, trip the door and pull the plane up sharply. A full load was released in about seven seconds. In actual checks at the lakes there was less loss of fish than in horsepacking them in.
