Name Oregon Top Ranking 4-H'ers

Three to the 27th National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago were given four Oregon club members as rewards for their outstanding records in the 1948 National 4-H Canning, Farm Safety, Field Crops and Health programs. The state winners and brief outlines of their records follow:

An outstanding youthful farmer, George A. Jefferson, Jr., 17, of Shedd, has won State honors in the National 4-H Field Crops awards program. George planted and tended 66 acres of small grain and pasture and six acres of corn and learned much about seed bed preparation, use of fertilizers and approved cultivating and harvesting methods. George says he learned that it pays to rotate crops and plant adapted seed. He also found time to take part in many community activities and for three of his six years in 4-H, served as leader of his local club. George gave 37 talks before community and club meetings and helped to enroll many younger 4-H'ers. In recognition of his achievements, International Harvester Co. provided George with a National 4-H Club Congress all-expense trip award.

Canning 220 quarts of food helped 4-H'er Betty Louise, 16, win state honors in the National 4-H canning program. She also, in six years of club work, has completed 24 projects, making 30 garments, preparing and serving 29 meals with 55 separate dishes, and cultivating 36,000 square feet of garden. She has held every office in her local club, and is now a leader. Betty was provided an all-expense trip to the National 4-H Club Congress, Chicago, by the Kerr Glass Mfg. Corp. as recognition for her outstanding achievements.

The practice of best personal health habits and aid to home and community health service has won Margie Meier, 15, of Hillsboro, State honors in the 1948 National 4-H Health Improvement program. Margie made a study and improved the lighting facilities of her home

Spring Valley Health Club, Polk; Riverdale 4-H Health Club, Tillamook; and Grand Island Health Club, Yamhill.

By eliminating accident and fire hazards around his farm and home, and community, Charles Hornecker, 16, of Cornelius, has won top State honors in the National 4-H Farm Safety program. Charles has accomplished much in 4-H safety work such as studying and practicing safety on the highway, taking special precautions when handling electric installations and using safety measures in operating farm machinery. He has given demonstrations on pedestrian safety, repairing an electric cord, safety with a cutting tool and making a first aid kit. In addition, he has found time to serve as leader of two different safety clubs. In recognition of these achievements, General Motors provided Charles an all-expense trip to the National 4-H Club Congress, Chicago.

All of these activities are conducted under the direction of the Extension Service of the State Agriculture College and USDA cooperation.
