Plans for the powerhouse are not yet complete, and bids for it will be advertised separately.

The highway to the damsite will be ready for the contractor March 1. The remainder of the new road is to be ready by June, Col. Walsh said, and the railroad between Gates and Idanha will then be abandoned.

Stules of sites for obtaining aggregates at Mehama, Lyons and at Cumley Creek were explained by Frederick A. Grasier of the civil works design section. Other talks concerned cooling systems for the dam, and housing plans.

To get an idea of the vastness of the dam, compare it with a building. It will be the height of a 45 story skyscraper, or higher than and building on the west coast. At the base it will be almost a city block wide. At the crest, it will be fully a third of a mile from one side of the Canyon to the other.
