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Red Cross Drive Starts

Ridgley Miller, Veterans Administration representative of Salem told the Women's Club Tuesday night of the Red Cross drive and the need for fulfilling the planned goal.

He declared that the blood bank phase of the Red Cross program was highly important to the area because adequate plasma would save lives of men injured in the dangerous jobs at the Detroit dam.

He said that the first aid program of the organization also was vitally important to this area. He related that lives might have been saved in accidents in the woods if proper first aid practices had been used.

The Red Cross gives free courses and will pay expenses of local people training for first aid.

Mr. Miller answered complaints of profiteering of the Red Cross during the war by saying that during the emergency there may have been persons hired by the agency that did not keep its high standards. He said the organization should not be judged by the actions of a few.

"The Red Cross is part of your local community insurance. It is par-

ticularly important with the problem involved in the construction of the dam. It is ready to stand by and help in any emergency."

Mrs. Charles Wolverton, local chairman, said workers have responded well and the drive will be under way this week.

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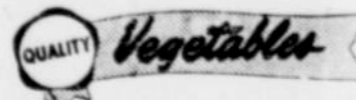


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
