Mr. and Mrs. John Estey drove to Bend on Sunday, thence to Holly to visit her sister, Mrs. Willard Booker and family.

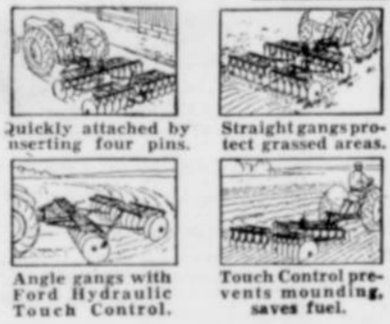
