num pension of \$50 a month, when and if there is a sufficiency of funds in the state treasury so to do. If not, the pension will be less in lieu of no guarantee. The same term of legislature enacted a law of giving the state the right to sue and collect money from the children when and if they are judged to be able to contribute money toward their parents' keep and fail to do so. The younger generation are expected to buy new homes and supply them with an automobile or airplane and all the modern machines, devices and contrivances on the market, which employ many workmen to produce.

If we are to compel the younger generation to support or partly support two families, we are bound to see a striking curtailment in the buying of the modern machines and contrivances, which create much employment, or else we will witness a little higher scale of wages and standard of living, caused by the demands of labor unions. Why not take a common sense understanding in regard to our elderly citizens? Why not abolish all present kinds of pension systems and institute one unique state or federal pension law, supported via a sales tax or gross income tax, collected from everybody as we go, no strings or liens on the pensioner's property, and award exactly the same adequate pension to all citizens, men and women, at age 60, and ask them to retire from the labor market, creating more jobs for all under 60, and eliminating unemployment, poverty and much crime from our land. All money comes from all commodities produced, when sold on the market, and the ultimate consumers

pay all taxes. The collective bargaining law in this country provides the way for all classes of working citizens to collect a sufficiency of pay commensurate with their taxes and cost of living. There should be no fear of being taxed for a pension that will grant you an adequate living at age 60. It would raise your wages and standard of living slightly, but you would find yourself in much better circumstances, with more jobs to choose from than you have today. This is equal rights and genuine democracy.
