



At the plant, wood waste enters the top of the retort and drops into a series of three troughs, moved by a screw conveyor system. By regulating the speed of the screws, the volatile content of the product can be determined. Air is excluded, and the gases resulting in the carbonization process are distilled 'Progressive line production is the secret of the whole thing, said R. U. Bronson, owner of the Trio Lumber Co. and an officer in the charcotl firm. The reaction may be considered in three stages - drying, decomposition of wood and subsequent cracking of the primary tars to form secondary charcoal. Oils and tars are condensed. Research is now being conducted on the commercial value of these distillates.
